## Message From the Dean

Hi AGO Friends,

Happy May!

As the program year winds down, we find ourselves relaxing just a little with fewer projects looming on the horizon, and fewer choir anthems in the “to practice” pile. Breathe. Reflect. Rejoice. Summer beckons and longer days are beginning to stretch before us.

I love this time of year. No mosquitos are buzzing in my ears when I sit on the deck in the evenings. We eat our evening meal later. The birds sing in the morning, but not at 4:00 am...yet. The children down the block still have school on weekdays, so they go to bed before I do, and loud outdoor activities cease at sundown. (During June and July they will be out playing later than my bedtime!)

It is also the time of year to renew our AGO memberships. Most of us will have received our ONCARD emails with the reminder to pay our dues, which typically stretch July to June yearly. ### Minutes of the RRV/AGO Board Meeting April 10, 2015

The meeting was called to order by Dean Sally Harmon. Other members present were Jean Roberts, Andrew Steinberg, and Robyn Vinje.

The minutes of the March meeting were previously distributed electronically, and were approved.

Jean reported that we have \$3,804.96 in the treasury (checking account). She stated that we get an \$18 deposit through the Automated Clearing House from AGO when a member pays dues. Sally will write an article in *The Pipeline* regarding the new rolling dues procedure through AGO.

The Basically British program on March 15<sup>th</sup> was a very enjoyable program, and was attended by about 100

people. Thanks to Andrew for organizing and chairing this program.

Andrew reminded us that Dr. Joel Bacon of Colorado State University will be presenting a concert at Trinity on April 19<sup>th</sup> at 4:00 PM. The secretary will send an email reminder to members.

Our last meeting of the year will be held Tuesday, May 19<sup>th</sup>, at 6:00 PM at First Pres. It will be a potluck and music exchange.

We then discussed possible programs for next year:

October 31                      The Ominous Organ, with Halloween theme to be presented by AGO members in costume, and chaired by Andrew

December 7                      Christmas Sing-a-Long at First Pres with Fargo 7:00 PM Moorhead Area Music Club, with Sally and Jill Post as co-chairs

February                      The Arts Council will have a Shakespeare theme for the month "If music be the food of love, play on" could be our theme. A central location might be best.

May, 1<sup>st</sup> weekend                      FM Choral Artists (formerly Chamber Chorale) would like to partner with AGO for a program of choral/organ pieces, and solo organ pieces. It will be held at First Lutheran. Michael Colliton will direct the choir. (This would be in lieu of our "big" March program)

There, of course, will be further discussion on these programs.

Sally read a letter from Marilyn Schempp, North Central Regional Coordinator, asking for suggestions for a new Coordinator of Professional Development for next year. She also sent another letter reminding chapters that District Conveners and Professional Coordinators are available for their programs during the year. No action was taken on either of these.

Andrew announced that Trinity will be having a program on organ for high school students in June of this year.

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## Composer's Corner—Remembering Wilbur Held 1914—2015

Wilbur Held, composer, teacher, and servant “gentle and humble in heart” (Matthew 11:29), died on March 24, 2015 in Claremont, California, a few months shy of his 101st birthday. A deeply thoughtful and meticulous musician, Held crafted elegant preludes, postludes, and hymn settings that remain central to the repertoire of church organists around the globe. Substantial yet accessible, his music reveals the truths of Scripture in the shape of a line, the content of a progression, the evolution of an idea across a work, and in the attitude of humility they embody. His musical language reaches back through the centuries and brings those influences to bear in a style that is distinctively of our time.

Published mostly in seasonal or themed collections, Held’s music is also widely popular for its appeal to beginning – to intermediate-level players. “Wilbur Held makes organists of even moderate ability sound good,” an admirer recently noted. “And he also turns even garden-variety hymn tunes into great musical settings.”

Held’s first collection, the still-popular *Nativity Suite*, was conceived for his students at the Ohio State University as a colorful alternative to the dreary exercises in common organ methods of the day. “I thought of these kids going back to the farm at Christmas time,” he once said, “and Dad takes them over to the church and says, ‘And what will you play?’ ‘Well, how about page 34 in the Gleason book?’”

Students and colleagues urged him to submit the collection for publication, and to his surprise it was accepted. This led to a demand for more, and his catalogue grew rapidly over the next half-century. His final collection, *New Every Morning*, was released in 2014 by his longtime publisher, MorningStar Music Publishers.

Held has said that the gestation of every piece starts with an idea. “I’ll take the hymn and look for distinctive lines in the melody that could be worked into some kind of sequence that would indicate the piece,” he said. “Often there’s a phrase that repeats itself, or maybe it’s just the starting phrase that is distinctive. As the piece develops you can kind of railroad in that starting phrase or sequence.” Held has always been deferential about his music, even with all the success it has enjoyed. “I hope there’s something kind of original about what I’ve done,” he reflected two years ago. “But I don’t think I have much of a claim, really, for originality. Everybody’s done what I’ve done. It’s more a matter of emphasis than originality.”

Wilbur Held was born on August 20, 1914 in Des Plaines, Illinois. He studied piano as a youngster and became serious about the organ in high school, going on to attend the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago where he studied organ and began to develop his compositional voice.

A conscientious objector, Held spent the final years of World War II cooking food without vitamins for a path-breaking project on nutrition now known as the Minnesota Semi-Starvation Experiment. Its findings were later published as *The Biology of Human Starvation*.

In 1946 Held was named professor of organ at the Ohio State University for what became a 30-year tenure. After years of summer study in liturgy and hymnology at Union Theological Seminary, Held was able to significantly expand the church music program at OSU.

Held moved to Southern California in 1997, following the death of his wife Virginia. Visitors to Held’s apartment were often regaled with stories about his extensive collection of Southern California Caliente pottery, crafted in the 1930s and 1940s. Through their efforts the couple’s painstaking work on an intricate cataloguing system for their trove, public awareness of this important part of California’s artistic heritage was restored. Held played for virtually all memorial services at the Claremont Manor, the retirement community in that college town where he last resided. There was a familiar saying around the Manor, that has long rung true: “First you go to the hospital, then you go to the Care Center, and then Wilbur gets you.” Thanks be to God for the long and fruitful life of Wilbur Held, and for a musical legacy that will endure.
